DEDICATED

Description

Combining practical scheme and beauty of design in perfect balance, the new building of the Andover School District No. 1 will be dedicated Wednesday evening, June 13, the culmination of two years of community effort. The building will be merged with the present program.

The dedication climaxes months of actual building operations, following about six weeks of preliminary work taken to comply with the legal requirements to the L. C. Whitford Co. who had the general contract and Lyman of Buffalo were the architects.

The total cost of the project is \$380,000, including the building, the landscaping and the purchase of the land. The school building is designed to accommodate approximately 600 pupils. The number of pupils within the district, and attend school with the building for regular sessions next fall, totals about 600.

Located on Elm street, the building is directly across from the present Andover High School, in which the central building has operated during the past 25 years. It is about 250 feet back from the street. An asphalt road running parallel to the school property on the north side of the rear where buses will load and unload pupils attending the school during the day.

The school property covers this adjoins the Village Athletic Field, and the activities of the community center in recent years. The Athletic Field for recreational purposes and sports will continue as at present. The added advantage that the building will be directly from the school to the field without crossing the street.

Playground areas are provided for the smaller children of the school property directly rear of the building.

The building is of Colonial design, with the main entrance on the front. The building provides a gymnasium and in the two wings, the pillars rise at the ends of the building, making a distinctive architectural feature of the building. The Colonial style is further enhanced by the
