Dr. S. B. Scott is Elected School Trustee

Annual Meeting of the Andover Central School Held Tuesday Evening Was Well Attended.

Dr. S. B. Scott was the unanimous choice of the voters of Andover Central School District for Trustee at the annual meeting of the board of trustees held at the central district hall auditorium of the new central Tuesday evening.

Now that the new school building is completed and furnished there are several facts of interest to taxpayers as to the financing project which we are pleased to pass on to the public.

In the first place, the estimated cost of the new building, complete, furnished, was \$380,000 arrangements were made to make amount available to the Board of Education for that purpose.

Total cost of the building and furnishings, however, was kept down to a total of \$376,000. Second, the first year of operating as a school has been completed at a cost of \$4,000 less than the estimate, published before the realization was voted and accepted Tuesday's school meeting \$7,000 less than the estimate for the second year's operation of the school. The above are a fine credit to those in charge of the financing and operation of our school affairs.

Now that the Central School District is in its new home, and we need the use of the former facilities which belong to Andover Union Free School District plans are in the offering for a special meeting of District to take some action on the sale of this property, the proceeds of which will undoubtedly be used to reduce the indebtedness now carried by that district.

In connection with our new editor is in receipt of the following letter, which we are passing on to our readers:

To the Editor:

Dear Sir:

As a person with what is life-long interest in school I feel impelled to offer contributions to this school district. The marvelous building just completed in Andover. My mother was a school teacher and at the year I crawled around that red school house floor taught for 35 years, I have 36, my husband taught and my son is a teacher. My father is also that of one who lived in every section of the north, east, south and west. Children who seldom seem to consult any actual teachers for the needs of such a school.

Last year I took a sabbatical from my duties in the New York school system and made the circle of the United States via the southeast coast to Texas and the Pacific Coast to Alaska, then across Minnesota to New York City. In detail because every time I visited schools old and new everywhere I found structural errors, entailed inconveniences and often dangers to children and pupils.

I found the same waste space place for anybody from ten to high school teacher. The really vast amount of other teaching material, including the modern pedagogical methods. This material, including the attitude towards school from one of the horror where to me the only interest, to produce where conduct problems are negligible because of the school work it found in new buildings, decorative schemes, internal, all very expensive money which should be used for equipment of the school.

I found large buildings where a teacher if tired or he down in the primary of even one child taken ill, I found large places where it
