After being part of the United States Department of Agriculture for 50 years, the weather bureau at Cornell became, on July 1, a part of the Department of Commerce.

The reason for the change, ordered by the President, was that government officials believed weather reports most important and essential for modern air travel and that the Department of Commerce was the place to handle the surveys and reports.

The bureau at Cornell, however, will continue to issue its weekly weather and crop reports during the growing season, as well as other reports of value to farmers.
