Census Shows Allegany Gain

Allegany county was the only one of the 43rd Congressional District to show an increase in population last decade, Census Superintendent J. Foley of Jamestown announced recently.

Population of Chautauq, Warren, Yates and Allegany counties showed an increase of 126,457 in the last decade, according to the census. Chautauq dropped from 75,497 to 72,126 and Allegany from 89,497 as compared to 87,497 a decade ago.

Wellsville gained 251, and the population figure is now 1,000,000.
