School Meeting District 1 To Be Held

Disposition of Old School Property to Be Discussed by Voters Friday, August 30th.

A meeting of the school voters of District 1 of Andover has been called for Friday, August 30th at 7 o'clock for the purpose of discussing and taking action concerning the disposition of the school property belonging to the district.

According to law, property belonging to a former school district and if sold, the proceeds belong to that district and are to be used for the benefit of the school taxpayers.

The procedure followed by the district is to appoint a committee to represent the district in taking investigations and in presenting the action of the district to the voters.

The suggestion has been made that the house and property of the former school district be sold this fall before the school is out, so that the proceeds could be credited to the tax roll before the taxes were paid.

It is hoped that the result would be a reduction in the tax rate of about 10% for the coming year of about \$1.00.

George W. Backus

The following obituary of George W. Backus, brother of the late Mrs. Backus, is reprinted from the Westinghouse Springs Independent.

Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock at the Methodist church for George W. Backus, who died at his home, Monday, July 27. Rev. E. F. Buechler preached the sermon. Miss Margaret and Miss Mary Backus, accompanied at the funeral by Mrs. R. W. Bromwell.

George W. Backus was born Sept. 13, 1860, at Flat Bush, N. Y., and died at his home on Monday, July 27, 1940, at the age of 79 years, 6 months and 13 days. He was the son of Rev. and Mrs. J. E. Backus.

Mr. Backus learned the trade when a very young man and followed this trade until his retirement was too great for him. He then moved to South Andover, where he was employed by the first train after the railroad in January of 1885. He came to Kimball by train and worked in the town of Waterbury, where he was engaged in the way and helping to build the road through the enormous distance. Mr. Backus returned to South Andover and became full owner of the property in 1893. In 1893 he moved to South Dakota and was engaged in the general merchandise business with O. P. Hull at Gannville for three years.

He was united in marriage to Miss Emma Brady of Gannville Nov. 30, 1893, who survived him and was constant beside during his last illness.

In 1896 the firm of Backus and Hull sold their interests in the town of Waterbury to Mr. W. J. Hughes. Mr. Backus came to Westinghouse where he managed the district for three years, then moved to the farm for three years, then into the publishing business. He purchased the business and conducted it as his own. He then sold his newspaper and returned to Fred M. Backus and returned to his farm where he resided.

He was instrumental in the organization of a co-operative store here in 1898.

On May 27 this year he suffered a severe accident from which he never recovered. Since that time he had to the hospital and there he was a great sufferer. Mr. Backus was widely and highly esteemed by all who knew him. He was honest, true and in whom confidence was never misplaced. He was a member in national and state organizations and was well versed in the history of the district.
