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## Frank A. Wilkinson

The following obituary of Frank A. Wilkinson, former Andover resident, is reprinted from the Cuba Patriot of last week:

A well known resident and former mayor, Frank A. Wilkinson, died suddenly at his home on Mill street last Thursday afternoon. For many years he had been a millwright and master mechanic of Phelps & Sibley company, and had served the village as assessor as well as president.

Mr. Wilkinson was born at West Clarksville July 9, 1870, the son of Orlando A. and Regina E. Landon Wilkinson. On Nov. 1, 1892, he was married to Miss Ina M. Jordan of West Clarksville, who survives, with two children of the marriage, Basil J. Wilkinson of Olean and Frances, Mrs. Duane H. Anderson of Wellsville; also two grandchildren, Jule and Carrol Anderson.

Mr. Wilkinson was superintendent of the Mutual Gas company of Andover for 13 years prior to his coming to Cuba in 1908 to act as refrigerating engineer for Demcey & Sibley Co. He then became connected with Phelps & Sibley Co., taking care of the power, building and maintenance problems of the business since that time.
