UNIFORM PRICE FOR August Milk Is Announced

Brings 13 Cents Per Hundredweight Than July Milk Says Market Administrator Cladakis

A uniform producer price of \$1.51 per hundredweight for 3 percent butterfat content milk received plants in the 201-210 mile zone from New York City is announced by N. J. Cladakis, administrator of the Federal-State orders regulating the handling of milk in the New York metropolitan marketing area. The uniform price of \$1.83 August represents an increase of 2 cents per hundredweight over the price for July deliveries, Mr. Cladakis said.

This uniform price is based on Class I or fluid milk price of \$1.41 per hundredweight, a Class II fluid cream, price of \$1.86 per hundredweight and the following for each of the remaining classes which represent the various milk used for various manufacturing purposes: Class II-B milk, \$53 per hundredweight; Class III milk, \$1.403 per hundredweight; Class III-A milk, \$1.401 per hundredweight; Class III-B milk, \$53 per hundredweight; Class III-C milk, \$1.143 per hundredweight; Class III-D milk, \$1.128 per hundredweight; Class IV-A milk, \$53 per hundredweight and Class IV-B milk, \$1.11 per hundredweight.

Mr. Cladakis reported that the uniform producer price computed for the month of August is a total of 448,956,399 pounds of milk. This milk, based on the which the Federal-State order established for each of the ten classes, had a net value of \$753,960. Dedications of \$420 for market service claims by handlers were made from this leaving \$3,047,490.86. Claim by handlers for market services total \$325,964.15. The net amount provided for in the surplus milk moved to the market. Payments to natives amounted to \$94,818.90 to those co-operatives which determined by the Secretary of Agriculture of the United States the New York State Committee of Agriculture and Marketing meeting certain requirements of the orders. These payments relate to the ability of the surplus of each of the co-ops to function in a manner set forth in a whole.

A total of \$248,255.24 was by the Market administrator \$8,087,490.86, which represents amount of unreserved cash producer-settlement fund. This total of \$8,335,746.10 net administrator is holding reserve required by the order \$209,635.28 to provide adequate contingency of errors in repayments or of delinquent payments of handlers.

The milk included in the price computation for August from approximately 61,000 farmers in the states of New York, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Massachusetts and Connecticut.
