## DISH FOR THIS WEEK

### FRUIT UPSIDE-DOWN CAKE

A combined cake or fruit dessert is an upside-down cake.

Any of the following fruits or combinations of fruits may be used: Two cups of sliced peaches or pears, either fresh or canned; or 8 halves of fruit; 2 cups of sliced, fresh apples; 4 slices of canned pineapple and maraschino cherries; 16 halves of apricots, fresh or canned; 12 halves of dried cooked apricots and 6 cooked prunes, seeded and halved; any fruit with halves of walnuts, pecans or blanched almonds.

### Cake Batter

1 1/2 cups of sifted cake flour  
1 1/2 teaspoons of baking powder  
1/2 teaspoon of salt  
1/2 cup of granulated sugar  
1 egg, well beaten  
1/2 cup of milk  
1/2 teaspoon of vanilla  
1/2 cup of butter, melted.  
Mix and sift the flour, baking powder, salt and granulated sugar. Combine the beaten egg, milk and vanilla. Gradually add the flour-sugar mixture to the dry ingredients, stirring until it is mixed. Stir in the melted butter and beat the mixture vigorously for one minute, or until it is creamy.

### Syrup for Fruit

Melt 3 tablespoons of butter in a large skillet or a square cake pan. Add one-half cup of firmly-packed brown sugar and stir it until it is dissolved.

Arrange the fruit in the sirup, cut side up, and cover it with the cake batter. Bake the cake in a moderate oven (350 degrees F.) about 50 minutes. Loosen the cake from the sides and bottom with a spatula and turn it out on a cake plate. Serve it with whipped cream if desired.

For a family dinner, the College suggests: baked fresh fish with parsley butter, scalloped tomatoes with green pepper baked potatoes, cucumber salad, wholewheat bread and butter, peach upside-down cake, milk for the children and tea, coffee or milk for adults.

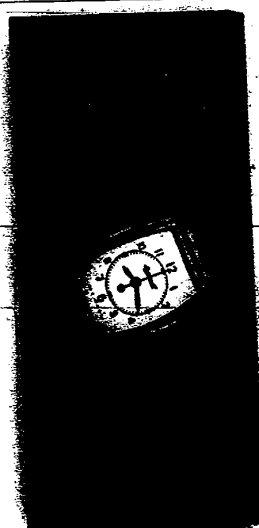
