Hunting Season Opens Monday

The open season on partridges, squirrels and other game opens next Monday, Oct. 15.

The pheasant season opens on Nov. 2, except the Sunday when pheasant hunting is not permitted. Two cock pheasants may be taken in one day.

Partridges and squirrels may be hunted thru Nov. 18. Rabbits a day and 15 in the bag limit, and five may be taken.

The cottontail rabbit season opens thru Jan. 31st, and the open season on varying game until 1942.
