There are a lot of lads that are going around our town with their chest out and shoulders back. And right well they may, for there is a fine buck deer hanging up to cure out and make a feast of kings for their family. Deer should be left to hang out in the cold air for at least a week or even longer if the weather is not too warm. This acts to tender up the choice cuts.

Some time ago a friend of mine came back from a moose hunt in Canada bringing a five pound roast of moose meat to our table. From the articles I had read on moose, especially eating the same, it was good sense to take along a food chopper to cut the meat up after it was cooked if you expected to eat it. Imagine my surprise upon cooking this well-cured piece of choice meat to find it so tender we cut it with a fork.

There are various ways to serve any kind of meat and game, both being the flesh of animals. The only difference being one has a wild taste because of the fact for generations it has been able to choose its food and being able to move about as it will rather than being shut up and stuffed with a limited diet.

If you do not care to have the wild taste predominate in the meat simply put in three whole onions about the size of a baseball in a five pound roast and cook as you do your regular meat. When the onions are done and before they fall apart remove from the dish and discard them, along with the wild taste they have taken up.

The reason I am passing out this advice is because of the many deer taken by Andover hunters and several have asked me how to cook venison.

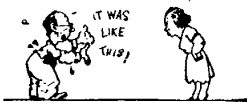
