## Allegany County Bull Wins Superior Sire Rank

A Jersey bull owned by the First Allegany Jersey Bull Association, is the first Jersey bull in the United States to receive the Superior Sire award, based entirely on herd improvement registry records. This bull is Creamy Lass' Jap Baron 350-067, owned by the Allegany County Farm, the Alfred State School, and H. B. Covell & Son, members of the bull association.

The American Jersey Cattle Club, commenting on this award, says, "The unique record of Creamy Lass' Jap Baron is given further importance by the fact that all production records of his daughters were made on twice daily milking." This accomplishment has only been matched once before.

According to the records of the United States Department of Agriculture, working with the Allegany County Dairy Herd Improvement Association, the first 15 Baron daughters have an average production of 9,101 pounds of milk and 514 pounds of fat with an average test of 5.6 per cent. This is an increase of 1,710 pounds of milk and 115 pounds of fat over their dams.

The Superior Sire requirements for Baron were completed last summer when the herd at the Allegany County Farm, under the direction of Dr. J. G. Howe, was classified according to type. Baron classified very good, and 14 of his daughters were judged, four rating very good, five good plus, and five good.

## Payments Total \$4,580,000

New York State farmers will receive this year about \$4,580,000 as payments for taking part in the Agricultural Conservation Program, according to Carl Wooster of Union Hill, chairman of the state committee.

With 76,000 farms enrolled, the average conservation and adjustment will be about \$60 a farm, he says. To earn their payments, participating farmers carry out soil-building practices and adjust crop acreages.

Mr. Wooster says that a substantial part of these payments were in the form of materials used to protect and rebuild the soil, such as lime and superphosphate.
