As an example of what can be accomplished by research in other fields, and what can be expected i agriculture, Mr. Livingston cited coal. "At the beginning of the century, virtually all coal was used raw. It was regarded only as a fuel. Today, chemical conversion accounts for 15 percent to 20 percent of the consumption of coal, and the proportion is growing. For instance, one chemical plant alone consumes a million tons of coal a year in the making of more than 100 products. These include anti-freeze, fertilizer,' plastics, refrigerants and solvents. This significant change has come about through chemical research. Instead of a basic antagonism between industry and agriculture, Mr. Livingston said industry is alert
