



## News Changes to Tabloid Style

The News comes to its readers this week in a new form, the increasingly popular eightpage tabloid.

This change is made necessary by war conditions which have greatly reduced the incomes of weekly newspapers and the scarcity of materials,

As intimated in the News some weeks ago, a change in the form of the paper has been inevitable for some time, and after considerable study, the tabloid seems to be the most practicable... Announcements to the effect that newspapers must curtail their consumption of newsprint during the first quarter of 1943 ten per cent of their 1941 consumption made same move necessary as we have increased our subscription list some 75 papers since 1941.

While the paper size is reduced about a third we are also reducing the size of our type so that our readers get more lines in each inch of space so the reading content of the News is only reduced about one-fourth, which, in our opinion, will give us ample room to publish all local news. ...
