Budget or Else!

FROM time immemorial people have made fun of budgets and when they haven't made fun of them, they've often made them out only to let them become the proverbial scraps of paper. But a new day has dawned. It's budget now or else suffer the consequences and nobody knows much about the consequences yet.

First, you had better budget your money carefully, figure out your income tax right away if you haven't done it already. You may find it is going to be quite a jolt and you might as well be prepared to meet it. That's one kind of budgeting, the most+ familiar kind.

Then you had better budget your fuel, particularly if it is oil, or you'll run short and you won't want to ever look at one of the supplementary applications; the rationing authorities have cooked up, probably especially designed to discourage such applications.

Still another budgeting proposition is food such things as meat, butter and milk, as well as sugar and coffee. Added to these will be frozen and canned foods and nobody knows what else when the rationing really gets under way. Your budgeting may result in a voluntary rationing which might help to prevent compulsory rationing of more items. doubtful because the system seems to be forced rationing as a policy rather than an attempt at co-oper-

So, it's budget, budget, budget! Budget or starve, budget or freeze, budget or go broke. It has come to all and sundry, whether they like it or not!

During the eight and half months the District was in operation 61 complete farm plans were drawn up covering 10,164 acres of land. These plans cover cropland, pasture and woodland de-

In this portion of 1942 strip 2537 acres was planned with 889 acres actually going into operation. linear feet of diversion terrace was planned with 34,900 linear feet constructed. 528 acres of pasture clearance or thornbrush removal was planned with 75 acres actually cleared. 117 acres of reforestation are planned for
