Here's How We Get Our Heat

Do you know what makes a particular classroom hot, cold or comfortable? In an effort to find the answer, this reporter made a trip to the boiler room to investigate the school heating system and equipment.

He learned from Jim Nobles that the steam boilers in the basement, which are heated by gas, heat the radiators in the rooms. In the return pipes the steam is held up by a valve until it is cooled to a certain temperature. The valves then open and allow the condensed steam (water) to re-

turn to the boilers. When the temperature reaches 55 or 60 degrees the radiators 24 are closed off and the rest is left ' to the fan system. These fans bring in outside air, which is heated by passing over steam heated coils. These fans are controlled by themostats, which turn the heat on or off automatically. -----ACS-----
