



Allegany county will see plenty of action in the form of practice blackouts beginning this month, according to Harold W. Leilous, county Director of Civilian Protection.

In announcing the plans for numerous practices, both daylight and night, as indicated in a recent communication from Edward C. O. Thomas, New York State Director of Civilian Protection, Mr. Leilous also reminded the people of Allegany county of the new regulations now in force pertaining to blackouts.

Effective April 23rd, Air Raid Protection Regulations No. 1 as issued by the Second Service Command for the states of New | York, New Jersey and Delaware were adopted by this state. These new regulations differ in many ways from those used in previous practices, Mr. Leilous pointed out 'and urged all citizens of the county to study carefully the new regulations as released by his office this week. This information is contained in a brief summary of the pertinent points of the new regulations printed in adjoining columns.
