Newspaper advertising is a manufactured product just as much as a plane, a gun or a tank—and the Government does not ask the manufacturer to produce these free of cost. Many industries have been greatly expanded due to Government war orders, while newspapers, at the same time, generally suffered a large reduction in adver-
