# Voluntary Wartime Conservation Program

ELECTRIC SERVICE

ON THE USE OF

The attached suggestions of the War Production Board will assist you in ehecking your use of electricity to make certain that you are not needlessly wasting it:

### 1.—IN YOUR HOME

(a) Turn off lights and appliances when not actually needed.

No effort should be made to curtail lighting that is used for reading, sewing or other critical visual tasks, but only use it when it is needed.

### 2.—IN YOUR PLACE OF BUSINESS

(a) Indoor and Outdoor Advertising, Promotional and Display Sign Lighting

(1) Daytime: Eliminate completely. (2) Night time: Reduce burning hours so far as practicable but in no case burn for an interval exceeding two hours and only during the period from dusk until

10:00 P. M. Electric signs necessary for direction or identification of places of public service, such as public restaurants, public lodging establishments, transportation terminals, etc., may be operated during night time but only while the establish-

Reduce lamp wattage of all signs by the maximum practicable amount, at renewal time when lamps are burned out or make an equal saving by discontinuing the use of some of the lamp bulbs and using the discontinued bulbs for burn-out replacement.

### (b) Decorative and Ornamental Lighting Including Decorative Floodlighting

(1) Exterior lighting: Eliminate completely at all times. (2) Interior lighting: Eliminate all non-essential lighting; reduce the balance by the maximum practicable amount.

(c) Show Window Lighting Which Does Not Provide Essential Interior Illumination

(1) Daytime: Eliminate completely. Night time: Reduce burning hours so far as practicable but in no case burn for an interval exceeding two hours and only during the period from dusk

until 10:00 P. M. Reduce wattage by maximum practicable amount, at renewal time when lamps are burned out or make an equal saving by discontinuing the use of some of the lamp bulbs and using the discontinued bulbs for burnout replacement.

(d) General Interior Illumination and Show Case Lighting

Eliminate all non-essential lighting. Reduce remainder by the maximum practicable amount consistent with public safety consideration and eyesight conservation.

(1) No effort should be made to curtail lighting in these and other similar interiors where visual tasks are difficult and prolonged.

(e) Offices, Drafting Rooms, School Rooms, etc.

(f) Outdoor Recreational Activities (1) As outdoor recreational activities are considered essential for wartime morale,

the use of lighting necessary for this purpose should not be curtailed.

3.—IN YOUR FACTORY (a) No effort should be made to curtail lighting essential to eyesight conservation, plant safety and protection, transportation and production.

Many economies can be achieved in the use of electric energy by industrial plants both large and small without adversely affecting the volume of production or the other factors mentioned above.

Use what electricity you need for your essential use, but don't waste electricity merely because it isn't rationed, for waste of any kind in War is a crime.
