prize will be a \$250 one-year scholarship. If the winner does not go to college a cash award will be given. The second prize is \$100; third, \$50 and fourth, \$25.
Reference material will be sent to the English teacher, Mrs. Marie McFadden, who will be adviser for the contest.
The contest sponsored by the Sheriff's Association will deal with the topic of "School Bus Safety." The title is optional with each contestant. Any phase which will bring about a reduction of fatal and other injuries to those who ride in buses may be dealt with.
The participants are confined to those people in the Sophomore, Junior and Senior classes. The essays will be limited to 1,000 words with a minimum set at 700 words.
Each student will select a pen name and also a serial number, preferably one with four digits. He or she will write that name and serial number on the essay but does not otherwise identify the essay. The contestant then writes the same name and serial number on a slip of paper which is placed in a sealed envelope. The envelope should be attached securely to the essay. After the judges decide on the winner they will compare the serial number and pen names to find out who really wrote it.
The State prizes are as follows: First, \$100; second, 50 and third, \$25. Our own county is offering the following prizes to contestants: first, \$25; second, \$15; third, \$10; fourth, \$5, and fifth, \$5.
The essays must be given to Mrs. McFadden not later than 4:00 p. m. January 6, 1947.
It is preferred that the essays but typed, but typing is not a requirement.
Several students have already registered for these contests and others who wish to write an essay for the contest must register with Mrs. McFadden not later than Friday, December 13.
