It's news, definitely, when a city elects to have a full civic holiday to honor a man dead 13 years. It's news, also, when the inhabitants of this self-zame city align themselves into a gigantic "committee o

25,000" to promote the day in question.

Lackawanna is the city and the day is July 29 which marks the 13th anniversary of the death of Rt. Rev. Nelson H. Baker. Commemorative exercises honoring "Father" Baker will be held in Lackswanna on this day. These exercises, according to Rt. Rev. Msgr. Joseph E. Maguire, pastor of the National Shrine and Basilica of Our Lady of Victory, Father Baker's last great work, will consist of Solem High Mass at 10 o'clock in the Shrine and Basilica followed by a pl grimage to Father Baker's grave in nearby Holy Cross cemetery, where special prayers will be recited.

Father Baker, who died at 95, is buried in the same plot with his father and mother. His grave, visited by thousands annually, is fast becoming a shrine in itself.

In honor of the great man that Father Baker was and is, the city of Lackawanna this year, for the first time, has declared a full civic holiday on the occasion. Further, all Lackawanna, under the leadersh of Mayor John J. Janiga, is combined into a vast committee to promote the day and all it stands for. All stores and other places of business will be asked to close between 10 and 12 out of respect for Father

Several score of civic, religious and social groups throughout Bui-Lackawanna and Western New York have indicated that they will participate in the memorial services in the Shrine and Basilica and the procession. Mayor Janiga is inviting the Mayors of every city and town in Western New York to join in the memorial.

The first "Father Baker Day" was observed in 1945 when over 8,000 persons in all walks of life participated. Most Rev. John F.
