But a ground or water burst leaves a great amount of deadly radioactivity behind in a spray of dirt or fog that spreads contam-ination as it falls to earth. Radiation, even if you have absorbed a considerable amount of it, s not always fatal, however.
If you have been officially notified that the explosion was ground or water burst and you are near the damaged area, do not use any food or drink which has been exposed. It may be contaminated. You will be told

if you must leave the area There is no immediate way _of __ _ knowing when you have been exposed to radiation during or after the atomic burst. You will not feel anything if radiation hits Signs of radiation sickness show up läter. How much later depends upon how much radiation you have absorbed.

Until you are out of the contaminated area. try to keep your mouth and nose covered to avoid inhaling radioactive dust or spray. Do not pick up objects on your way out of a contaminated area, you may be carrying contamina-






