HOME ECONOMIC

Everyone, including that noisy and jolly kid brother of yours will like his spinach this way. 2 cups cooked spinach, drained 3 egg yokes, beaten.

Two-thirds cup milk. 2 tbs. butter or margarine One-half pound cream cheese One-half teasp salt One-eighth teasp. pepper 3 egg whites stiffly beaten.

Chop spinach fine, set aside; combine egg yolks, milk, butter and cream cheese broken up. Heat over a low flame, stirring until smooth and thick. Add salt and pepper. Divide cheese sauce into two parts, mix half of it with spinach. Fold in the egg whites, turn into buttered individual custard cups, place cups in pan partly filled with hot water. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees) until firm, about 20 minutes. Turn timbales out on warm serving dish and pour remaining cheese sause over them. Serves six.
