Auto Licenses On Sale Monday December 3

New York State motor vehicle registrations for 1952 go on sale at all issuing offices in the State next Monday (December 3) with several new twists in the annual

Vehicle Commissioner Clifford J. Fletcher today called special attention to three new

Vehicle owners under 21 years f age must furnish proof of insurance coverage in order to register for 1952.

Fees for commercial vehicles, suburbans and trailers will be computed on a new basis and at A 1952 date tab will issued, to

be used with 1951 license plates. The tab, which will be issued with new registration certificates, cantains the numerals "52" in orange on a black background. In addition, it will have a serial number corresponding to a serial number which will be stamped on the registration certificate.

The tab in each case is to be attached to the lower right hand corner of the rear 1951 registration plate. Commissioner Fletcher emphasized that, although only one tab will be issued, both front and rear 1951 registration plates must be kept on the vehicle in 1952. For passenger cars the tab will be two inches 2 7:16 inches in size and have a bolt hole matching the lower right hand slot on the

As only one plate is issued to trailers, this type of vehicle will continue to display only the rear

Use of the tab, as a substitute by the 1951 Legislature as a conservation measure to save steel. It will at the same time provide a State budget saving of about

1952 registration tabs may not be displayed on vehicles until January 1, 1952. On most types of vehicles, 1951 registrations are valid until midnight, January 31, 1952. For tractors, the rate contin-

ues to be based on unladen weight-but is increased from 80 to one dollar a hundred. The new schedule of fees for commercial vehicles follows: Commercial Vehicles (autotrucks and light delivery trucks)
