### Safeguarding Sight

The eyes are delicate and complex, but hard-working organs the body which can serve us well throughout life if we give them a little care.

Care of the eyes should begin. early in life. The child who gets regular physical examinations, including checkup on his eyes, has the best chance of having any possible eye defects early. Parents should be on the alert for any signs of sight imperfections in a chlid. Crossed eyes, continwal squinting, chronicall red of watering eyes, blinding or scowling, means something is wrong, and the child should be brought to the doctor without delay.

Ideally, every child have a complete physical checkup which includes thorough eye examination before he starts his school life. If a child has begun school without it, however, should get a medical checkup c his eyes as soon as possible. Divider for Dresser Drawers If one of your New Year's resolutions is to keep tidier dresser drawers, you'll like this tip from the specialists at the New York 'ollege of Home Economics at Use drawer dividers to keep hose separated from scarfs, nightgowns from slips, and so on. Make the dividers of lighteight wood, corrugated paper, heavy cardboard.

They should be far enough a part to provide room for storing garments and low enough height so you can reach easily into the compartments. Fasten the dividers in place with masking tape which is a kind of scotch tape. One advantage of this tape as a fastener is the ease with which you can remove the dividers and rearrange them to suit your storage needs.

## Cranberry Relishes

The tart flavor of cranberries makes them an excellent base for relishes. Some mixtures you may want to try are these, suggested by the Cranberry Kitchen: Mix cranberry sauce—with a diced fresh pear, a half lemon, chopped, and a teaspoon of powdered ginger. Or blend together cranberries, a quarter cup of mincemeat, and chopped walnuts. Or try jellied cranberries, the juice of a lemon, and half cup of raisins, spiced with a quarter teaspoon of cloves and half teaspoon of cinnamon. Any of these are a good complement to the meat course.






