To Iron Hankies

Give those new Christmas-gift hankies good treatment when you iron them. Here are some . Smooth the handkerpointers: chief wrong side up on the board. Iron the lower half of the hankie remembering to iron with the grain of the material. Fold down the upper half almost to the lower edge of the ironed part. Fold the handkerchief with your left iron in your right. Iron the folded-over part. Fold again, left to just a little beyond the right edge. Only the top corner should show. Iron crease, if you wish.

Most any good Yorker likes his cakes with maple sirup, but just for a change now and then you might want to try orange sirup.
