#### Better Health For Children

A Community Service Issued by Children's Hospital of Buffalo, N. Y.

Pulmonary tuberculosis is a curable disease caused by a germ which is transmitted from one person to another through continued close contact with someone having the disease. Although young people can have a mild form of TB without being seriously ill, in young children it is often fatal. Doctors at the Children's Hospital of Buffalo remind parents of the importance f protecting very young children from contact with anyone having persistent cough or history of

it should be pointed out that it is possible for an audit to have active tuberculosis without showing any of the usually associated symptoms such as loss of weight, persistent cough or unexplained weakness. For this reason all adults and young people over the age of 18 should have an annual chest X-ray to make sure they are as well as they feel and look.

Pre-natal X-ray examination is an important precaution against fection of newborn infants. ise parents will further protect their children by having an annual chest X-ray and by requiring the same of all those who are in constant close contact with them and the children. This includes not only household empioyees but other members of the family. Many older people cling to the mistaken belief that they are immune to tuberculosis. Anyone - anywhere - can have this disease. Giving the baby a taste of food from a spoon which has been used by someone else is not only unsanitary but dan-

The only way to be sure you are free of TB is by X-ray and medical examination. Many schools give students a tuberculir or a patch test. The tuberculin test consists of injecting a small amount of special solution under the skin. If a red spot develops, it is called a "pos

itive" reaction and indicates that the child has, at some time, been exposed to the disease. The patch test is made by leaving a tuberculin-saturated days, which also shows whether Ars.
