March 1-10 this year according week by Conservation Commissioner, Perry B. Duryea.

Traps without teeth and with jaw spread not exceeding six inches are the only legal devices for capture. They must bear the name and address of the operator and must not be placed before 7 a.m. of opening day nor remain placed after 6 p.m. of closing day. They must be visited at least once each 24 hours and may not be placed closer than 15 feet of any beaver den or house. Dams, dens and houses also must not be disturbed, but traps may be set within 15 feet

All beaver pelts must be tagged within five days of the season's close by a Game Protector (not a special protector) in the county or adjacent county to
