

Better Health For Children

A Community Service Issued. by Children's Hospital of Buffalo, N. Y.

Recently there have been an unusal number of cases of virus infections throughout Western New York. These have occurred in children as well as adults in three different forms. In some instances the germ settles in the intestines, causing diarrhea; others there is high temperature nausea; and some patients iffer the usual fever and aching conditions without either the diarrhea or nausea.

Doctors at Buffalo's Children's Hospital have found that some children develop a high fever without warning symptoms and for 24 hours feel very sick but return to normal almost over night. This virus so lowers the patient's resistance to infection, that not infrequently a bacterial infection may occur as sociated with or immediately follewing the original attack. Any should be reported to the family doctor at once to avoid possible be kept in bed, quiet and, unless nauseated, should be given plenty liquids. Your doctor will prespecial, light diet until the fever against giving a child any drugs which have not been ordered for him by their doctor. Many modern drugs are not recommended for children except on the advice of a physician.

In most cases of virus infection, the fever lasts from 48 to 72 hours and after the temperature has returned to normal, the child should be kept in bed an leaves the which might cause a return the fever. If it does return call
