Choose a piece of wool that you're sure is colorfast and cut from it a rectangle 15 by 24 inches. It must be in one piece with no seams. Then cut another press cloth of the same size from lintless cotton. You may wish to wash this cotton cloth several times to remove all of the dressheat, and gases in the ing. Stitch the woolen and cotton clothes together along the 15-

When you want to use press cloth, wet the cotton fabric, lay the woolen side against the garment to be pressed, cover the woolen side of the press cloth with the wet cotton side, and press. The woolen press cloth holds hie steam and helps to pick up the nap of the woolen
