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
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

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In some sections of Western New York there have recently been an unusal number of cases of chicken pox reported for this time of year. For this reason doctors at the Children's Hospital in Buffalo point out that this ually serious. Sooner or later almost all children are exposed to chicken pox. Small children are less severely affected by than older ones who may develop high fever and feel very sick.

Because it is not always possible to know whether your child has been exposed, it is recommended that you call your doctor promptly if the child has a rash, feels ill or runs a temperature. If you know when your child was exposed watch for the symptoms to develop from 11 to 19 days later.

Chicken pox starts with small pimple-like eruptions on the face and body. These contain a yellowish liquid. After a few hours they break leaving an itchy scab. For the next few days new blisshould be kept in bed. 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
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
