Before you start spring house. cleaning, consider the most common causes of falls and make sure that your house doesn't have these lurking hazards.

Do the children ever leave toys on the steps. Next, what do you stand on when you reach the top of your windows or your cupboard? A stepstool, a short stepladder, or a firm, steady chair? Or do you sometimes step up on a rocking chair or a rickety table or box-whatever happens to be nearby? 




