Hill of Elmira for the following clipping from an old edition of the Andover News found in the effects of her uncle, Rev. Sheerer, a former Andover clergyman— When I came to Andover in May

1864 the village was very small compared with its present size. The school house stood on Center remember the struggle for a better place for the children and when what is now the old house was built, many said it was too large and costly, but time has marked a great change

At that time the M. E. Church was worshiping in a small wooden building now known as the Imperial Hotel. Strange contrast with it's former use. The old church had the old fashioned pews, the high box pulpit. One man said was like getting into a barrel and preaching thru the bung hole, At that time the women sat on one side of the room and the men on the other. Mr. H. P. Benton takes some credit in helping to break up that custom.

The Presbyterians had an old delapidated building standing on the west side of Main street near where Brundage's bank now

One day a fire broke out in an old saloon standing where Porter's Hardware now stands. It burned a hardware store, an old hotel, the old church, then turned across the street, burned a store on the corner of Main and Greenwood street, then turned on the opposite corner, burned N. Y. Ellis store, Jacob Elwell's furniture store, and stopped at what was then H. P. Benton's drug store. Your humble servant takes some credit for the part he took in helping stop the fire and he added at that time "If I had set the fire and started it I could not have done a better job for Andover."

The Baptists were worshiping in the old church on the same site where it now stands.
