Before babies reach the age of three months they commonly cry Mrs. Catherine Greenan, 37, for long periods at a certain time ren's Hospital say that most babies cry at the end of the daybetween six and ten o'clock. It is natural that by this time the infant is tense and tired which may make him irritable or bring on a mild attack of colic.

Colic usually develops soon The baby may have sharp gas pains which make him scream and draw his knees up. It is always feeding but this is especially important with a colicky baby. Frequently, colic pain is relieved does not interfere with a baby's health of weight gain.

Why do people on relief get cash instead of vouchers to use at the

In the light of experience, cash relief is generally considered preferrable to vouchers it is cheaper to administer and more flexible. Vouchers, however, may be used in individual cases where they seem more practicable. Cash relief permits the recipient to shop for bargains. It answers complaints of business men that they are not getting their full share of the trade, and it contributes to the recipient's self-respect. (Additional questions about
