You need to protect curtains .com strong sunlight, too. It's a good idea to keep the shades lowered on the sunny side of the

Don't wait too long to have your curtains laundered or dry cleaned, advise the home economics specialists at Cornell. If they are quite soiled, the extra effort used to get them clean may damage the curtains.

If you have rayon curtains, remember that rayon is weak when wet and that you must handle it carefully. Mild soap, lukewarm water, gentle squeezing, and only a warm iron are best for this fab-






