

Attention is called by the State Conservation Department to an important change, effective July 1, 1952, in the law governing the issuing of hunting licenses to

Under the amended law, a minor under the age of 21 rather than 17 as in 1951—will not be entitled to purchase icense unless he presents to the issuing agent (1) his license of a previous year, (2) an affidavit from a license-issuing agent that he held such a license, or (3) a certificate from an agent of the Rifle Association of America, a game protector, or a person designated by the Conservation Department to give inin safe handling firearms, the affidavit certifying that he has received such instruction and is entitled to purchase a hunting license.
