Your Pasture Dollar

A dollar spent for grassland or pasture improvement will return more feed and more dollars than if put into any other type of feed. More feed means more milk, more beef, more eggs, etc. all of which increases income and profits. A leading extension economist reports that a dollars spent on ladino pasture will produce about 100 lbs of total digestible nutrients. The same dollar spent for hay will buy only half as much effective feed or one-seventh as much grain. In this year of rising costs, it is more important than ever before to have each dollar spent pull its full share to increase Recent publications by the U.S. Department of Agriculture show that farm income has dropped 47 per cent from a year ago, and that production costs have increased, whereas the things the farmers buy have gone up. For instance, the farm wage rate is 11 per cent above last year, machinery is up from 6 to 8 per cent and feed prices are up about per cent. In addition, the prices seeds, fertilizers, pesticides alding materials, and taxes are nigher than a year ago.

Farmers can and should graze the pastures and grasslands heavily during the spring and put any surplus grass in silage. This can be fed during poor pasture months or during the winter, and is an excellent source of green feed-almost equal nutritionally to the pastures themselves.

The feed value of these grasses depends on harvesting at the proper stage as well as on the fertility of the soil. In order to grow good grasses and legumes, the soil requires the right amount of nitrogen, potash, phosphorus, calcium. magnesium, and many minor elements. The calcium and magnesium are added to the soil in the form of agricultural limestone, whereas the other elements are mainly obtained from chemical fertilizers. The calcium and magnisium (limestone) are the most important of these elements and their cost throughout the country has gone up less than onehalf of one per cent in the last five years. This is one of the principal reasons why your pasture dollar will bring you such a favorable return today.
