

Scissors and Shears

How can you know that a pair of scissors or shears you're buying is good? You can't judge the quality of the metal by looking at at. The best way is to go to a reliable dealer and select a wellknown brand, advise the home economic specialists at Cornell. Choose scissors or shears ac-

cording to the work you want them to do. For snipping and trimming, select scissors. They are generally 3 to 6 inches long and have both handles alike. For cutting fabric, you'll want shears. They are longer than scissors and have one blade heavier than the other; the handles are not alike. Don't use dressmaking scissors or shears to cut cardboard, flower stems, heavy cloth or twine. Keep old scissors or utility shears

for these heavy jobs. Keep your scissors and shears dry to prevent rust from forming on the blades. Oil them occasionally with a drop of sewing machine on both sides of the screw that holds the blades together. Work the blades back and forth gently and wipe off the excess oil. Small Potatoes

When the summer potatoes are dug, don't waste the "Marble" size, say the food specialists in the U. S. Department of Agricul-. Small new potatoes may be frozen.

Select potatoes about 1 to 1½ inches in diameter. Scrub the potatoes vigorously in cold water or scrape them to remove all skin. Heat the potatoes in boiling water for 4 minutes. Cool them promptin cold water and drain them. Pack the potatoes into containers for freezing, leaving no headspace between the packed food and the closure. Seal the containers. Freeze and store the food at o degrees F. or below.


