Deer Season Dates Released by ^a State Department

Albany, Aug. 26-New York open for many weeks but the advance application for licenses and questions concerning the hunting dates have been so great that Conservation Department officeials said today that nearly 400,000 deer hunters might be expected afield. A total of 365,517 deer licenses were issued last year—as compared to only 68,000 in 1932. The deer herd itself was believed at an all-time high, numbering up around a half-million head-far more than during the days when

whitetails all year around. The herd has over-populated its range in so many areas that the Conservation Department again will attempt to balance the equities this fall and also help give agricultural crops a break with a two day special season November 28-29 when one deer of either sex, antlers or no antlers, will be legal quarry in all or parts of 29 counties, mostly in western New

Here's the whole round-up of dates and places for the 1952 sea-

Adirondacks and adjacent regions-October 25 through November 30. One buck with antlers at least three inches long. Rifle, shotgun or longbow legal.
