A complete physical check-up should be a routine for every child entering school. This is the time to find out if a child has any physical defects which may hinder a happy and successful adjustment to school. Glasses may be needed. There may be a hearing deficiency which can be checked before it get worse. There may be faults in his eating and sleeping habits which must be corrected. Heart and lungs should be tested to make sure that he can carry a full program of work and play. The dentist should examine his teeth and begin any necessary work. And, of course, it is vital to find out whether the child has any contagious disease or skin condition which his school mates




