

Agricultural News

IRA BLIXT, County Agent

H. Ira Blixt, county agricultural agent, stated today that he had just received from a Cornell. Entomologist information regarding the recommended planting dates for wheat, to avoid the Hessian Fly injury.

For elevations of 2000 feet or more the date of September 5-15 is recommended; for elevations of 1600 feet, September 9-19; and for an elevation of 1200 feet.

He stated that Prof George G. Gyrisco of the Entomology Department at Cornell, stated that the Hessian Fly is at its lowest point in years in New York State, and by farmers following these

The agent reminded farmers, however, that it is well to plant wheat as soon after those dates as possible in order to get a sets in. He also recommended that seed beds be well fitted and firmed, and well fertilizer, which all goes to make up for a good wheat stand, and better yields, as has been experienced by many producers throughout the county


