

> Blue babies are listless and unable to play as normal children do because of the lack of oxygen in their blood. X-ray examination shows their hearts to be misshapen and a stethoscope can detect abnormal heart sounds which are indicative of pulmonary stenosis. By surgery a portion of the blood which has left the heart is returned to the pulmonary artery through the lungs and flows back through the heart a second time before circulation throughout the body. Due to perfecting this operation, hundreds of children and young people who had been handicapped by what was termed "bad heart" are now able to play and live normal lives.
