If you're adding to your supply of sheets now, Cornell's clothing and textiles specialists recommend sheets with a smooth and even texture—no knots, broken yarns or rough spots.

The selvedge edges should be at least one-fourth inch wide and they should be flat and closely woven. Hem edges should be stitched down and should be flat and smooth. Standard-sized beds require sheets 108 inches long, but the width may vary from 81 inches for a double bed to 54

inches for a cot. To keep your sheets fresh and new looking as long as possible. never jerk them from the beds. Don't iron creases into sheets, and vary the number of folds in the sheet after washing it by folding in quarters one time and in thirds the next.

### Care of Aluminum

Don't soak your aluminum kertles and pans for long periods in soapy water or in any other water that is strongly alkaline, advise the home economics specialists at

Use mild soap, or another mild detergent, and water to wash your pans each time after you use them. This is important to keep them from being pitted. If food sticks to them, scour with fine steel wool or a mild abrasive such as whiting. Rinse them well with hot water and dry carefully. To remove dark alkali stains,

cook tomatoes, rubarb, tart apples, or a weak vinegar solution in the utensil.

> Cleaning of Wicker Furniture To clean reed, cane, and wicker furniture, you will usually dust it with a stiff brush or a vacuum cleaner attachment. If it's badly soiled, though, wash it with mild lukewarm soapsuds and rinse with clear warm water. Be careful not to soak the fibers; dry it thoroughly after the rinsing. Rinse outdoor wicker furniture with water from a garden hose and dry






