





Dr. Blanford reported that milk production in August, was the heaviest for the month on record October 10-15 He said that despite the loss of 510 dairymen from the number supplying the market a year ago, production had risen 4,104,894 been split experimentally in two pounds, or 0.72 percent, from the previous August high of 572,655, 639 pounds in 1951.
