The doctor will first try to find out what kind of pollen is causing your attacks of hay fever. Once this is known it may be possible to avoid the pollen to some extent and to build up your resistance to it. Shots of pollen desensitization treatments are sometimes used to build up resistance. Mechanical devices to filter polen from the air of rooms where you spend most of your time may be advised. Your doctor may suggest a trip to a pollen-free area for your vacation. He may prescribe anti-histamine medicines, drops, or sprays to relieve your discomfort Because the emotions have a strong effect on allergic disorders, the doctor will advise you to avoid worry, fear, anger, resentment, or excitment. If you let small annoyances "get you hay fever.

What's Your Farm Really Worth

The 1952 price of New York State farms is the highest on record. Average value per acre of New York farms (land and buildings) has increased as follows: 1940 - \$55. 1950 - \$62, 1950

What really determines the valyour farm: If you plan to sell it, the value is what you can get for it. If you plan to work it the value depends on the net earnings. For example; suppose the average annual net earnings of your farm, after taking out a reasonable wage for yourself, is \$1000. Then you might say the farm is earning interest for you at 5 per cent on \$20,000. In other words, you "capitalize" the net income of your farm into value. The following are important factors that affect New York farm

.. The General Price Level: Farm land prices usually lag a year or two behind changes in the general level of prices of the

2. Demand for Rural Residence: The number of people who want "a home in the country and a ob in the city" is steadily increas-

3. The "Law of Water and Molasses." When prices in general rise or fall drastically, prices of things farmers sell change like water flows, while the prices of things farmers buy change like molasses flows. The great variations in net farm income caused by this 'law' are reflected in the price of farms.

eral remain high, farm land prices should continue high. If not farm income declines, land prices may be expected to soon follow. poor land over-valued in relation to the income they will produce. farms on good land and farms on poor land is likely to grow wider. Good land will always be the bet-

hedge against inflation because the market value of real estate, livestock and equipment increase along with the general price level, while debts do not. But, a farmer also needs a hedge against deflation. A financial reserve savings such as U.S. Defense Bonds or bank savings is a good hedge against deflation. The doilar invested in this way will have a greater purchasing power real estate prices fall and one of these dollars will always pay a dollar of debts.
