Appeal The Allegany County Public _ Welfare Committee is now con

ducting its annual appeal for funds in order to continue and expand its services to children in foster homes and to help people dependent upon the county, according to M. Elwood Kenyon of Alfred, chairman of the Appeal.

Mr. Kenyon said that the money raised will be spent for "many of the little things that make life happier for children and older people but which cannot be met y public funds."

One of the many ways in which this is done is the giving of weekly allowances to children in foster care under the supervision of the county welfare department. Children between the ages of ten and eighteen receive 50 cents a week and those from six to ten receive 25 cents weekly. Mr. Kenyon pointed out that this allowances means the difference between en a child's feeling independence and participation with his friends and the unhappiness and loneiness of having to watch other children




