"The use of the red Double-Barred Cross, an adoption of the historic Cross of Lorraine, as an emblem of the modern crusade against tuberculosis, was first proposed and unanimously accepted on October 23, 1902," Mrs. Stout-

On May 17, 1906, the National Tuberculosis Association, she continued, made the red Double-Barred cross its official emblem, and in 1920 the NTA officially registered the symbol as its trademark and the trademark of its 3,000 affiliated associations, including the Allegany Health and Tuberculosis Association. Since the early part of this century, the Cross has served as the emblem under which the voluntary association have fought the spread of TB in communities throughout the nation, Olean, Canisteo, Almond, Lockfight largely financed by the American people themselves thru their annual purchase of Christ-
