The Red Cross has been catled upon to undertake an immediate participation in the National Blood Program to make available all the gamma globulin possible for the prevention of paralysis from poliomyelitis. Experiment: conducted over the past years in Provo, Utah, Houston, Texas and Sioux City, Iowa, under the auspices of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis and as a part of their total research program have demonstrated the effectivesness of the treatmen. 



dertaken by an individual energy is further magnified when to their fatigue. an individual becomes tired. This particularly true of children, because they fail to recognize when they become tired, and as a result frequently have temper something at the end of the day. Most of us will recognize the

extremely aggravating sense of frustration which we experienced as children when we were told that we couldn't do something "because you are too tired" or "because you will get too tired." Our sense of frustration, course, was exaggerated because we actually were tired, and although we can recognize that fact now, it was hotly and sincerely denied when we were children. Because a child will be more willing to cooperate when he is

not tired, it is advisable to try and prevent fatigue rather than correct it. A child will more frequently submit to a nap when he is not tired and when it comes at accustomed times, than if he is required to rest at irregular periods and then only if he is considered to be tired.

It follows that the more active child, the child that is just full of energy and power never seems to get tired, the child that vigorously objects to afternoon naps, is just the child that is in most need of this rest. Restlessness, an attention span that is short when compared to that of his contemporaries, irritability, loss of appetite, poor weight gain and poor performance are all signs of fatigue.
