The Governor, in his letter submitting the proposed project, said the hospital "serves Allegany and Stemen countles in New York steamen counties in New Yesh State, and much of Potter County in Pennsylvania". The addition, if approved, he added, "will pro-vide the only facility for long term hospital care in this section of New York's "Appalchia" re-gion"

While the Village of Wellswille has approximately 6,000 popula-tion, the Jones Memorial Hospital tion, the Jones memorial Hospital serves an area population of about 29,000. The new addition would improve medical facilities for the area when completed, while its construction would contribute substantially to employment oppor tunities. The addition, if ap-proved, is expected to be in oper-ation within two years.

#### Proof Of Ownership On All New And Used Motor Boats Registration

An immediate tightening of registration requirements for proof of ownership on all new and used motor boats has been announced

According to James J. O'Brien, Director of the Division of Motor Boats, no boat registration appli will be accented unless it accompanied by the properly sign ed registration certificate of the former owner, or, in case of new vessels, a-bill of sale. The pre-paid dealer form, provided to matine dealers by the Division, will de accepted in lieu of a bill of saic for new vessels never before vegis-tered. The use of prepaid dealer forms for used vessels will not be accepted.

this procedure is not-followed. Mr. O'Brien said, the registration application will be returned to the

application will be returned to the owner, restaining in considerable delay in the issuance of a registration certificate.

Although the new procedure will affect the registration of all new vessels and the reregistration of sold used boats, it will not change the registration renewal process, he added.

"Our experience over the years, indicates an increase in boating thefts, fraudulent registrations and dishonest sales of registered ve-

dishonest sales of registered ve-sels," O'Brien said.

The new procedure is being put into effect to provide greater pro-tection to the boatmen, the buyer and the dealer.
