January 17th Deadline For Estimated Tax

Final payment of estimated Federal income tax on 1965 income is due Monday, January 17, 1966, according to John E. Foley, District Director of Internal Revenue in Buffalo.

Taxpayers who previously filed a declaration of estimated tax, but who believe that changes in income or exemptions occurring during the last quarter of 1965 will cause their income to be substantially more or less than originally estimated, may be required to file an amended declaration. This declaration also is due January 17.

Mr. Foley said that such a declaration should be marked "amend" and filed with the same District Director of Internal Revenue who received the original declaration. A blank amended declaration is printed on the back of the notice of payment due which taxpayers received by mail. Form 1040-ES (Amended) also may be obtained from any Internal Revenue Service office.

An original declaration of estimated tax for the year 1965 should be filed by January 17 on Form 1040-ES by taxpayers who first became liable for filing an estimate during the fourth quarter of 1965.

However, a taxpayer who is required to pay an installment, or who first becomes liable for filing a declaration, or who finds it necessary to amend his declaration in the last quarter of 1965 need not meet the January 17 deadline if he files his 1965 income tax return and pays in full the balance of tax he owes on or before January 31, 1966.

Document No. 5111, which furnishes more information on this subject, may be obtained by writing to your District Director, Internal Revenue Service.

News That's Print To Fit

Governor Rockefeller has placed before the 1966 Legislature a six-point program designed to curb what he termed "the bloody slaughter of traffic accidents."

The proposals are:

1. The Courts be authorized to require drivers who are convicted of moving violations to attend driver safety courses. With the enactment of such a law, the Governor said he would direct the Commissioner of Motor Vehicles to take whatever administrative actions are required to provide enough such local safety courses.

2. Cities of more than 175,000 population no longer be exempted from the requirement that municipalities use the Uniform Traffic Summons and Complaint which has proven very successful throughout the state.

3. A 30-day suspension of the driver's license be mandated for any person convicted of speeding more than 20 miles per hour above the speed limit, if such speed limit is at least 50 mph. A permissive 30 day suspension of the vehicle registration of such a speeder also would be provided. If a non-resident, the convicted driver would lose the privilege of driving in the state or operating a motor vehicle owned by him.

4. The problem of persistent moving violators be attacked by including in the New York State "point system" (1) all bail forfeitures for moving traffic violations in New York State if the forfeiture is not vacated within 60 days, and (2) all convictions for traffic violations in the six New England States, New Jersey and Pennsylvania.

5. All automobile dealers be required to have new cars inspected and certified before sale, in accordance with the New York State motor vehicle inspection program.

6. The enforcement of orders suspending or revoking operators' license and vehicle registration be improved.

Things To Look For From CONGRESS, 1966

President Johnson's promise of a short-and-sweet Congressional session this year is not likely to be fulfilled. Continued escalation of the Vietnam war has changed the outlook.

The war is now costing the American nation \$16.5 million per day, plus a mounting toll in lives. Still higher costs are expected in the coming year.

The White House has not taken the public into its confidence on the effect that rising commitments in Asia will have. Congress will try to ferret out the facts and put them on the record.

Domestic legislation will be affected by the rising cost of the military program. Congress is sure to insist that some domestic spending plans be curtailed.

In an election year and with an increasingly unpopular war to fight, Congress is expected to be less ready to simply approve every thing suggested by the Executive branch. Some LBJ defeats are predicted.

There may be as many as three Senate filibusters in 1966. One may come right at the beginning, if present plans to consider repeal of Section 14 (b) of the Taft-Hartley Act as the first order of business are followed.

Another prolonged Senate struggle may come on the proposed Constitutional amendment by Sen. Everett M. Dirksen (D., Ill.) to repeal the Supreme Court's "one-man, one vote" ruling.

There are rumors of another civil rights bill, and if the President decides to go for such legislation a third filibuster is probable. Three such delays in a single year would set a record.

Allegany County Public Hearing Scheduled For Southern Tier Expwy.

Albany — J. Burch McMorran, State Superintendent of Public Works, announced today a public hearing will be held at the Friendship Central School in Friendship on Tuesday, January 18, 1966 at 2 p. m., to consider the proposed construction of approximately 13.2 miles of the Southern Tier Expressway between Cuba and Belmont.

The proposed expressway extends from an interchange serving Routes 408 and 305 at Cuba easterly about 7.5 miles to a planned interchange with Routes 275 and 408 at Friendship. It then continues northeasterly approximately 5.7 miles to a planned interchange with Routes 408 and 19 at Belvidere, north of Belmont.

The expressway is planned as a four-lane, divided highway with control of access. Generally, it will extend parallel to and from 600 to 3,000 feet north of Route 408.

The proposed new expressway will provide faster, safer and more economical travel. It also should act as a spur to the commercial, industrial and other development of the area through which it passes.

The hearing will be under the general supervision of William J. Dennis, State Department of Public Works District Engineer at Hornell. Preliminary plans showing location of the project and properties in that area will be available for study. A DPW engineer will explain the proposal and outline its advantages.

Persons attending may present their views for or against the plan and its economic effects, by written statements or orally.

Information will be available on the Department's Relocation Assistance Program for those who must relocate if the property they occupy is acquired for the project. The availability of moving expenses also will be outlined.

The hearing will be conducted under Title 23, U. S. Code, Section
