LIVING UNDER LAW

What To Do If The Tax Auditor Calls

More and more taxpayers are getting audited as part of the government's revenue collection. If selected, you may well ask, "Why pick on me?" Well, you may have made an arithmetical error, deducted too much, claimed a large refund compared to your income, had a big income, had too small an income, or you may have been picked by chance.

There are many audits. An auditor may ask you to bring in your records to talk over your return. Often one talk is enough. Again, you may have several talks before the matter is closed. You may bring your lawyer along if you like.

Sometimes a federal agent may come to your home or place of business to check your records in person. Just showing the agent your records may satisfy him. But he may "adjust" your return. You then must take steps to pay, or to challenge his conclusion.

When a "special agent" comes to see your records, or if two agents come together, it may indicate a more serious investigation. You should immediately seek counsel.

As a rule, most honest differences over taxes are settled without suit, but not always. Whenever taxes are challenged, take prompt steps to protect your interests. People have lost good defenses or claims by failing to act within the time set by law.

The workload of the tax office has brought on automatic processing. Magnetic tape and other devices are being used to store and analyze returns on each taxpayer. That is why each taxpayer must now show his Social Security number on his return. The machine will match names returned with that reported.
